A Reminder on School Charters

Boards of Trustees are reminded that they have an obligation to provide a copy of their draft school charter to their Proprietor, so that the Proprietor may comment, particularly in relation to Special Character. Boards that did not supply their school charter to the Ministry of Education by 9 June have received a letter from the Secretary for Education requesting that charter documents be lodged with the Ministry by 1 July. The Ministry has acknowledged that some schools in the Canterbury earthquake areas may need further time, and has asked such schools to contact their regional Ministry of Education office.

New Labour Party Spokespeople for Education

Sue Moroney has been appointed the Labour Party spokesperson for primary and secondary education, and continues to hold the early childhood education portfolio. David Shearer has been appointed spokesperson for the tertiary education sector and continues to hold the research, science and technology portfolio. We wish them well.

Ultra Fast Broadband Transforming Education System

More than a third of all state and state-integrated schools will be fibre-ready by the end of 2011, with 97% of all schools receiving ultra-fast fibre over the next five years. The remaining 3% of schools will receive a high speed wireless or satellite connection. This will make NZ's education system one of the most wired in the world, and will give schools the capacity for high definition two-way video conferencing.

Driver's Licence Changes

From 7 August 2011 the minimum driving age will increase from 15 to 16 years old, and from 7 August 2011 under 20s will have zero blood alcohol concentration. ERO and National Standards

This year, as part of each school's education review, ERO is asking how Boards of Trustees, school leaders and teachers are working with the National Standards to raise students' achievement in reading and mathematics. Reviewers will also look at reporting to parents, in plain language, about students' progress and achievement in relation to the National Standards. Overall findings from reviews of all schools from Term 1 to 3 2011 will be aggregated in a national report.

Boards Spending Funds on Capital Works – a Reminder

Boards of Trustees are reminded of the need to follow due process when contemplating any expenditure relating to capital works with a value of \$5,000 or more. Guidance is available on the MOE website, and in the Catholic Schools Board of Trustees Handbook, on the NZCEO website. Failure to follow due process can result in significant difficulties with school auditors, the MOE or the Office of the Auditor General.

New Crown Agent for International Education

A new Crown Agent for International Education will be established from 1 September 2011, under Education Amendment Bill (no 4). Education New Zealand will be incorporated into the new entity, which will also have an independent sector advisory committee.
