The self-promotion fashion can be traced back to the years following World War II when the wider effects of the Great Depression and the World War gave way to the burgeoning of mass production and labour saving devices with readily available upmarket goods and services. Adults at that time, who had been through twenty years of deprivation, said they had had enough of restraint and sacrifice. Who could blame people for what was a legitimate stance in calmer, more prosperous times?

However, today we have too many people who are fundamentally self-centred, superficial and focussed on the here and now, often promoting themselves without giving too much attention to the huge number of people in the world who scramble to survive.

Much good has come about as the forces of globalisation have taken effect in our lives in the last forty years. This is undoubtable. However, it behoves leaders at various levels of society, including educators, to encourage attitudes in the young that are grounded in sound human values that create the fundamentals of well-being and resilience for all human beings. After all, the accident of where you are born ought not to be the basis for living a happy, fulfilling life. By challenging the superficiality of self-promotion in favour of promoting humility and the common good, we can contribute to the wellbeing of individuals and society.

Rathkeale College, Masterton: the school received a National Schools of Character award from the Foundation for Character Education Inc.



Did You Know?

Many children in Auckland speak two languages. After English, the biggest language groups are Chinese, Samoan, Hindi, Māori, Tongan. In the North Shore many speak Afrikaans, Korean, or Northern Chinese (including Mandarin). Pacific Island languages dominate in South Auckland. Hindi is rapidly rising, with Tagalog, spoken by Filipinos, also making significant increases. Mandarin is being offered in some Auckland schools. (Information from Herald on Sunday June 21, 2015)

Preparing for the Asian Century

Steve Maharey, Vice Chancellor of Massey University and Deputy Chairman of the Asia New Zealand Foundation, in an opinion piece on July 14 in the DomPost, noted that China will lead internationally in the 21st century, but so far few NZ schools teach Chinese or any other major Asian language. He suggests it is important that schools invite migrant cultures into schools to assist students to begin to understand these cultures. Teachers able to teach Asian languages, particularly Chinese, are urgently needed. Principals recently took part in a meeting with the Asia New Zealand Foundation to discuss how students can be taught the skills to thrive in a culture where understanding Asia is crucial.

Chinese Language Learning Sought by New Zealanders

Nearly half of New Zealanders surveyed recently wanted school children to learn Chinese, but just 4218 secondary school students were enrolled to learn Chinese last year, a distant fourth behind French (20,478), Japanese (11,888) and Spanish (11,573). However, overall numbers of students learning Chinese and Spanish are rising while student numbers for other languages are falling. Government last year launched the Asian Language Learning in School programme, a \$10m contestable fund over the next five years to support teaching Mandarin, Japanese and Korean.


