Editorial

The French philosopher Teilhard de Chardin once asserted that 'we are spiritual beings on a human journey'. Our post-modern lives, which are often quite frenetic, don't always enable us to focus on the spiritual dimension of our existence.

It is very easy to become reliant on excitement and adrenalin rushes to keep us going, when we would be better served if we nurtured our spirituality, so we were able to operate in a more fully human way.

The motivations that were appropriate in previous generations are not as applicable today as they used to be. Today's requirements to be an effective human being are more to do with developing a skill base which is multi-disciplined, empathetic and innovative. Collaborative behaviour, focused on alliance building, is more likely to develop greater life satisfaction and happiness. However, as people involved with the education process, we are challenged to link these two dimensions of who we are, as cited by Teilhard de Chardin. May we be courageous and resilient in meeting challenges, since if we lose this foundation we forfeit our reason for existence.

Christchurch Earthquake Support

On behalf of all integrated schools we extend our support for those affected by the earthquake in Christchurch. Overall, integrated schools escaped major damage, with the exception of St Paul's School, Dallington. We have been in contact with schools to offer support, and have been particularly attuned to the situation at St Paul's School. St Paul's reopened at the start of term 4 in buildings made available on the site of Catholic Cathedral College, as the Dallington site is completely unusable, owing to liquefaction. We are grateful for the very effective work of the Ministry of Education, whose staff have been superbly committed to the work of supporting schools and students. Congratulations on a job well done are offered to all Proprietors in the region, and especially Mike Nolan at the Catholic Education Office for his magnificent response to the disaster.

Religious Studies Achievement Standards and Course Endorsement

A recent letter from Bali Haque of NZQA has confirmed that students enrolled in courses assessed against Religious Studies Achievement Standards are eligible for course endorsement. Religious Studies is one of three subjects exempt from the requirement for students to achieve three credits at merit or excellence from externally assessed standards to be eligible for course endorsement. With two years of experience of the Religious Studies Achievement Standards nearly completed, the current standards will be up for review from 31 December 2010. Consultation with the sector will occur, to enable the Standards to be finetuned if necessary.

Initial Teacher Education Requirements Released

The New Zealand Teachers Council has released new approval, review and monitoring processes and requirements for ITE programmes that lead to teacher registration. These will apply to all ITE providers in NZ. Details are available at www.teacherscouncil.govt.nz.

Ten Year Rolling Property Plans

Proprietors and Boards of Trustees are reminded of their responsibilities for buildings. Many NZ school buildings were constructed between 1950 and 1980, and need to be progressively modernised. It is wise to put in place for each school a Building

Condition Assessment and a Modern Learning Environment assessment. Proprietors will need to put in place plans for necessary upgrading. It is important that the Proprietor works closely with the Board of Trustees in this area. A letter on the topic was sent out from NZCEO in mid August.

Education Review Office Latest Publications

The Education Review Office has just released:

- 'Promoting Success for Māori Students: Schools' Progress'. Based on reviews carried out in terms 2 and 3 2009, in 60 secondary schools and 227 primary schools, the document shows that in approximately a third of schools Māori student achievement has remained high or substantially improved; in 32% of primary schools and 45% of secondary schools there is evidence of some improvement in Māori student achievement; and in approximately a third of primary schools and almost a quarter of secondary schools there is no improvement. The conclusion of the report provides useful pointers on what schools need to do, and sits well beside Ka Hikitia Managing for Success: The Māori Education Strategy 2008 2012. The report can be downloaded from www.ero.govt.nz, or hard copies requested from ERO.
- 'Promoting Pacific Student Achievement'. This document follows on from the pilot evaluation document earlier in the year. It provides vital pointers, and sits beside the Pasifika Education Plan 2009-2012 as crucial information.

School Insurance Coverage

In the time since the Orewa College boiler explosion, Boards of Trustees and principals are likely to have been checking their boilers and also the coverage provided by their insurers. FMR Risk, the insurance broker to the majority of Catholic schools, has indicated that under Statutory Liability policy reparation costs and legal costs to defend the action would be paid under Vero Liability's Schools Liability policies. Other legal costs would not necessarily be covered, and a fine under OSH regulations would not be covered, with the Board required to make such payments out of school funds. A key point to note in the Summary of Facts issued by the Department of Labour is that

the school needs to ensure that all preventative maintenance tasks are carried out as in the relevant manuals, or according to the relevant standards or best practice. Boards would do well to refresh their understanding of their obligations under the Health and Safety in Employment Act 1992. Orewa College was found to be in breach of Sections 6 and 16 of this Act.

Investors in People Framework Is of Value to Schools

A number of New Zealand schools, including St John's School, Mairangi Bay, have found it useful to achieve accreditation with Investors in People. This business improvement tool focuses on people strategies, and is very relevant to schools. Originally developed in the UK and administered by the UK Commission for Employment and Skills, the company has been in New Zealand since 1999. It focuses on assessment (using the Investors in People Standard) and organisational development (applying the Investors in People principles).

Births on the Rise Again

With the exception of 2009, birth rises have continued in NZ since 2003. In the June 2010 year the Auckland region had 80% of the birth growth, and Waikato, Bay of Plenty, Wellington, Otago, West Coast and Gisborne had slight drops. Just over a quarter of a million babies were born between 2007 and 2010. These babies are starting to come into schools now.

Good Ideas

Every teacher could be asked to present a one page "effective strategy that works" to share with the whole staff.

Pompallier Catholic School, Kaitaia has set up a mentoring programme, Pompallier Disciples, run by Year 7 and 8 students. It uses a restorative practice model with a focus on forgiveness. Seniors are on a roster to help with conflict and issues during morning tea and lunch breaks.
