Echoing FD Roosevelt in the depths of the Great Depression, he also said, "None of our problems are beyond a solution if we overcome fear, which is the greatest obstacle of all."

Trans-Tasman Education Project

New Zealand and Australia will partner to explore how innovative learning environments can enhance teaching. The Ministry of Education and at least six New Zealand schools will participate in the four-year Innovative Learning Environments and Teacher Change project. Professor John Hattie, former Professor of Education at Auckland University and currently Director of the Melbourne Education Research Institute, is part of the project leadership team.

RERG - Rural Educational Reference Group

- RERG now has a social media presence on Facebook: RERG Rural Educational Reference Group.
- The New Zealand Principals' Federation has made 'Rural Matters' a major work stream led by Karen Brisco and has initiated conversations with rural and remote principals about the complexities and rewards of being a principal in a rural setting.
- Rick Powdrell said in a recent Federated Farmers Report to RERG that the levels of stress some farmers are operating under could well result in children presenting behaviour not usually pertaining to that child in the school environment. It is important that school staff equate these behaviours to the possible home pressures and act accordingly. It may be necessary to contact other groups such as the local Rural Support Trust, Rural Woman or some other agency to ensure the right people are linked to the family to assist in difficult times.

High Teacher Satisfaction

A Teaching and Learning International Survey shows 90% of New Zealand teachers who teach Year 7-10 students and 95% of their principals are satisfied with their jobs. Teachers care deeply about student welfare with 99% agreeing with the statement that "most teachers in this school believe that the students' wellbeing is important" and 98% agreed that "in this school, teachers and students usually get along well with each other".

Did You Know?

Statistics New Zealand says that the wealthiest 1% of NZers (about 34,000 adults) have nearly a fifth of all the wealth in NZ. The wealthiest 10% (about 340,000 adults) have more than half. The poorest half of the country (about 1.7 million adults) have only 3.8% of the wealth.
