Catholic schools across the nation could lead the way in addressing the stubborn achievement gap which is tarnishing our international reputation.

We have to be bold in accepting new ideas and good practice which we know does work. and be courageous in implementing it. Best practice can easily be common practice if the status quo is challenged.

In an address to students on 28 November 2011 Pope Benedict said, "Respect for the human being and respect for nature are one... There will be no good future for humanity on earth if we do not educate everyone to a more responsible way of life for creation."


"Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed."

In a Mass on 1 January 2012 the Pope said, "Educating young people in justice and peace is a task for every generation." He stated, "To assume responsibility for educating young people in knowledge of the truth, in fundamental values and virtues, is to look to the future with hope." Speaking on the education of conscience, which begins in the home, he said, "It is essentially about helping infants, children and adolescents to develop a personality that combines a profound sense of justice with respect for their neighbour, with a capacity to address conflicts without arrogance, with the inner strength to bear witness to good, even when it involves sacrifice, with forgiveness and reconciliation. Thus they will be able to become people of peace and builders of peace."

Strengthening the Culture of Catholic Schools

Schools with a strong Catholic culture: highlight the seasons of the Church year; celebrate major feast days; provide a Catholic calendar in the staffroom and classrooms (e.g. the Columban calendar) and refer to it; provide Catholic images and symbols in public places throughout the school, including crucifixes and statues, candles and bibles; frequently practise with staff and students a range of prayers and devotions, both contemporary and traditional; provide significant Catholic material in every newsletter; integrate Catholic Character into curriculum statements and lessons across the curriculum area.
