LIGHTING new FIRES

The adage, "when the going gets tough, the tough get going," is compelling motivation in this time of economic mountain weather. Given that large numbers of younger people have not had to endure the effects of a deep recession before, it behoves those of us involved with them to offer support as they navigate their way through the inevitable challenges many are facing, or will soon have to face.

This can be done by strengthening prayer opportunities in classroom and school assembly prayer time. Modelling engaging prayer forms enables young people to learn how to pray and learn how to be inspired in a fresh way. Christian hope which is founded on faith is much more than mere optimism. Hope enables the future to be squarely faced, since each of us is on a journey of hope, with God at its core.

There is plenty of independent evidence to support the view that faith-based spiritually oriented individuals are happier than those who are less so. May we adults who work with the 66,000 students in our nation's Catholic schools choose life, life that is based on the joy of knowing we are loved as sons and daughters of our Heavenly Father in whom we live and move and have our being.


Ann Nelson, recently appointed to St Joseph's School, Balclutha, is new to principalship in a Catholic School. We offer her our best wishes.

Recent Catholic Statistics

Worldwide, the number of Catholics grew to 1.147 billion in 2007, the number of priests increased to 408,024, and the number of bishops reached 5,000. The percentage of Catholics remains at 17.3% of the global population.



Statistics on Catholic Schooling

Lay teachers now make up at least 80% of the 3.5 million teachers working in Catholic schools around the world. Catholic schools currently serve almost 42 million students, and enrolment at Catholic schools has gone up about 60% over the last 30 years.
