Terminology around School Fees, Levies and Donations

The Ministry of Education has provided information to schools indicating that it is very important to clarify to parents that levies and fees are in fact donations or contributions and need to be referred to as such. Proprietors and Boards of Trustees would do well to review the wording in school prospectuses, websites, and accounts sent to parents, ensuring they refer to donations, not to levies or fees. All donations are tax deductible. Attendance dues are not donations and are not tax deductible.

The Value of Youth Mentoring

Mentoring is a straightforward, volunteer-driven approach to providing young people with at least one caring individual who will make a difference in their life, and who will make a long term commitment to them. Many young people today are starving for some attention and support. Those involved in mentoring find it is deeply rewarding.

Mentoring Project in Auckland

This year AUT has expanded its MEN (Males in Education) mentoring project to include 150 secondary school boys. St Peter's College, St Paul's College and Sacred Heart College are among the six Auckland schools chosen to participate.

Discovering Your School's Charism

Timothy J Cook of Creighton University believes that charism is embedded in every school, not just in schools associated with a religious order. It can be regarded as the school's focused identity, particular spirit, and unique gift to the Church and society. Pope John Paul II stated that discernment of charisms is always necessary. One way to do this is by asking questions in three areas: Experience: What energises the school community and gives it joy? What direction does the school intuitively take? Effectiveness: How are the school and its graduates successful? What is the evidence of school impact? Feedback: How is the school perceived? What draws people to the schools? How do members of the school community describe their experiences with the school?
