BEING A BELIEVER IN A SECULAR WORLD

The Jesuit philosopher Teihard de Chardin described each of us as "spiritual beings on a human journey", while Saint Augustine urged us to journey into our humanity where we will find God.

Today's world is one where believers experience a strong dichotomy between secularism and their life of faith.

Karl Marx saw capitalism as the uninterrupted disturbance of all social conditions, while today many seasoned commentators believe capitalism is responsible for providing the means of self-cultivation, providing tangible and intangible benefits for billions of individual human beings.

Following the fall of communism in the last decade of the 20th century Pope John Paul II, in his landmark encyclical *Centesimus Annus*, acknowledged the benefits of capitalism, but championed the importance of capitalism being operated within structures that focus on the common good of humanity. This is not always an easy fit!

As post-modern leaders and educators we are definitely on a lifelong journey, since we find God by exploring our humanity. There is so much we do not know about ourselves and humanity generally.

Thomas Merton famously said, "My Lord God, I do not know where I am going... and the fact that I think I am following your will does not mean that I am actually doing so." But he extended this elsewhere, "You do not need to know precisely what is happening or exactly where it is all going. What you need is to recognise the possibilities and challenges offered by the present moment, and to embrace them with courage, faith and hope."

Maybe a way to live within the ambiguity we all experience is to recognise that gratefulness is at the heart of faith. This framework allows us to deepen our faith, yet at the same time, the reality is there is very little certainty in our experience of living.

We are left with the often quoted dictum of St Augustine, "Lord, our hearts are restless until they rest in you."
