Catholic Schools Day

On May 16th Catholic Schools celebrated 41 years of integration as state-integrated schools. The transition from private schools to state integrated schools has been a wonderful journey in which both parties have had to discover what the meaning of this relationship is.

In the early years the Ministry of Education defined what they considered were the boundaries of our inclusion and funding. In more recent times, as both parties have unpicked their understanding of the Act, we have developed an understanding that for funding purposes our schools have similar, if not equal, entitlement to the State.

In the next iteration of understanding we will need to look at how our respective networks complement, provide choice and meet the needs of the 66,000 students whose parents value Catholic education. There are discussions to be had about our Network and the way it has planned to meet the needs of roll growth and respond to roll decline. Without this discussion we will struggle to provide for the needs of our children.

We might also ask what is it we have to do to ensure that our schools retain their mission — to be central to the mission of Church and yet remain within the state-integrated network.

In recent weeks we have begun negotiations to look at ways we could update the PSCI Act, and this has raised the consciousness of many about what was achieved and gained over the past 41 years. It has also highlighted that times have changed in the interim - the environment in which the Act was conceived is very different to the Post Modern Church of today. The PSCI Act needs to be able to respond to those changes without losing any of its key provisions for partnership with state and preserving Special Character in our Schools. Changes to the PSCI Act will not change the nature of our agreement with the Crown. The review will remind both parties of what was agreed and what is expected of us in a successful partnership going forward.
