The New Zealand Catholic school system will survive and thrive only if the Church is clear about and stresses the values that the system offers to its people. That is to say, the schools will only thrive if the Church continues to be successful in convincing its people that our faith has a fundamental value in their lives.

Our Catholic school system will do well only if the Church community recognises that it is a community of communities, and that the needs of the various communities that it is called to serve are different. The Church is now being called to more significantly recognise and cater to the needs of Pacific Catholics, Asian Catholics, and Catholics from any part of the world who come to settle in New Zealand. The obligation to Māori is taken as read.

Our Catholic school system will thrive only if it is able to believe in, nurture and build community-based schools in which a sense of ownership is shared by the parish community, principals, school staff, trustees and the parent body.

In the pluralistic and competitive environment in which Catholic people live, they have a dazzling array of choices for their children. Therefore, Catholic schools have to be remarkably successful in the work they do. If they are, they will be magnets for families who are looking for the "brand" that will make it possible for their children to be successful in life. And this is where the schools can become instruments of evangelisation. Students will come in the door expecting one thing (namely an entrée to a successful life) and will discover something far richer: a treasure beyond all telling, a system of meaning that will enable them to make sense of their lives, that will bring them into contact not only with the wisdom of the past but with the Author of All Wisdom. The "brand" will bring them in; the success they seek will keep them in the seats; and the wisdom of love will make them whole.

#### **Good Ideas**

- Some schools have a Catholic Character reflection area in their performance appraisal document, and provide self review indicators with a continuum from "needs developing" to "effective". Staff also indicate how they intend to fulfil the Bishops' expectations of twelve hours of professional development annually.
- One school has invited two other local Catholic primary schools to join them in an enrichment programme. Selected students work together and share resources, enabling all three schools to further develop their commitment to Gifted and Talented Students.
- One school's take-home classroom prayer pack includes a booklet in which to write family prayers that can be shared with the class the next day.

# Mary MacKillop, a Saint for Australia and New Zealand

Mary MacKillop was born in Melbourne in 1842, and died in Sydney in 1909. The Institute that she and Father Julian Tenison Woods founded, the Sisters of St Joseph of the Sacred Heart, was committed to the education and welfare of the poor of both Australia and New Zealand, particularly those in rural and isolated areas. Within 17 years of the Institute's foundation she responded to the call to send Sisters to New Zealand, to Temuka. Within ten years another nine schools had been opened here, and by 1917 a further 13 schools were opened throughout the country. She visited New Zealand four times, travelling from Auckland to Invercargill to see the newly founded convents and schools, and to look after their needs.

Catholics in New Zealand owe much to her generous and practical spirit and the caring style of education she developed for Josephite schools. In the 20th century the Sisters extended their work into secondary education, Catholic catechism correspondence lessons, CCD, motor missions and holiday camps for rural children. They also became involved in parish ministry and social works. In more recent years Sisters have been employed in diocesan Catholic education offices, working on the faith formation of teachers and Boards of Trustees, in other programmes for the faith formation of Catholic adults, teaching tertiary students at CIT, and one Sister became a Professor in the School of Theology of the University of Auckland. They have also been involved in the writing of our Religious Education programmes, and have recently established an alternative education facility, Mary MacKillop House, in West Auckland. We thank the Sisters for all they have done in New Zealand, and join in their delight at the canonisation of their beloved foundress. You are urged by our Bishops to celebrate her canonisation on 17 October 2010.
