Editorial

For many years international statesmen have urged national political leaders to promote the concept of global citizenship. At a very practical economic level this is a reality. New Zealand, for instance, buys and sells a myriad of goods and services to the world. This interdependence is now widely recognised and overwhelmingly accepted.

However, we have difficulty in going the next step when we come to seeing ourselves and the rest of humankind as powerful and contributing members of the global community. A global framework enables people to recognise that what affects one of us affects all of us, but acting together to solve our global difficulties seems to be almost beyond our reach, as the Copenhagen Climate Change Conference in December 2009 revealed.

One of the human traits that makes concerted global action difficult is the "we" and "them" syndrome in which others get blamed for problems, and therefore we expect "them" to take all the responsibility for actioning change.

Individuals, communities and nations that reach out towards one another and recognise they are global citizens with the responsibilities that citizenship brings, can make the world a better place. Building a culture based on respect for difference is an imperative for a small nation like New Zealand, which already has moral clout internationally. Seeking to privilege ourselves and our view of the world over that of others is not conducive to $international\ collaboration\ and$ understanding. Our planet is too small for this sort of thinking to be entertained.

Recognising the global citizenship of people in countries very different from our own may lead to significant rethinking of our personal world view, and will also create a climate for change that will strengthen our leaders' ability to act in the world forum.

If we can do this our children will have a $bright future-not\ an\ impossible\ dream.$

National Standards and Boards of Trustees

While this topic is a contentious one in some schools, as Crown Entities Boards have legal obligations in relation to the implementation of National Standards. NZSTA has provided Boards with information on these legal obligations.

Board of Trustees Elections 7 May 2010

By now schools will be seeking individuals to stand for elections, or to suggest names to the Proprietor as possible Proprietor's Appointees. People approached to stand require a suitable skills base, and need information on the role they are undertaking – there is plenty of material available to ensure potential Board members are well briefed. Self managing schools need the best possible people appointed to Boards, for the benefit of our young people.

Voluntary Contributions and Other Compliance Matters

Boards of Trustees and Proprietors are reminded of the need to follow carefully the lawful requirements on requesting voluntary donations and other costs. Similarly, they are reminded to comply with the regulations concerning the principal's remuneration. If there is any uncertainty in this respect it is important to check with the Ministry of Education.

Memorandum of Understanding Signed Between NZCEO and NZ Police

A Working Relationship Memorandum of Understanding was recently signed by NZCEO and NZ Police (Youth Services) to facilitate and support local level relationships and identify areas of common interest that can be worked on at a national level. Work will occur on shared operational/strategic issues, which will enable police to better support schools and their communities, and to improve communication between police and schools. Community-focused policing and collaboration are the foundations of the relationship.

NCEA Closing the Student Achievement Gap

The annual "state of the nation" audit by the Salvation Army's social policy unit hailed the pass rate in some decile one schools, which have leapt upwards, as proof that NCEA is working. Particularly successful decile one schools include De La Salle College, Mangere, where 99% of its school leavers achieved at least NCEA Level Two (quoted in the article), and McAuley High School, Otahuhu.

Schools Targeted in Productivity Drive

According to the Australian Financial Review schools worldwide are receiving significant levels of investment in areas such as maths, science and information technology. In Australia, National Australia Bank and McDonald's Australia have both launched major schemes, respectively to reward school-community initiatives and to provide a Maths Online tutoring programme. In England there are 3100 high schools and 3000 of them have a partnership with business or industry. Companies like to be known as good corporate citizens, and they recognise that a stable, prosperous community based on good public education is good for their business operations.

Payroll Giving and Employees - Something Helpful

Boards of Trustees and Proprietors are reminded that payroll giving is now operative. This enables individuals to donate to approved organisations direct from their pay and receive immediate tax credits. It may be worthwhile to publicise this scheme to parents. The scheme does not apply to attendance dues only donations. Details are on the IRD website.

Prime Minister's Statement to Parliament - Educational Items

The Prime Minister, in his Statement to Parliament on February 9th 2010, indicated that the Government views education as a fundamental tool for creating an egalitarian society, with a high performing school system at all levels being central to this. National Standards will be used to assist with ensuring funding is provided to those children and schools that require extra support in literacy and numeracy. Improved preservice training and inservice professional development will follow, as will policy on the use of information collected through National Standards. In secondary schools the focus will be on enabling further access to trades and technology teaching, and supporting the Youth Guarantee policy. The Government is also committed to improving social services and improving its approach to assisting families in need.
