OECD INTERNATIONAL EDUCATION STANDINGS (PISA)

In December 2013 the OECD published its secondary school education tables following the testing of a sample of 15 year olds from over 60 countries in mathematics, science and writing. (Programme for International Student Assessment – PISA).

Unfortunately, for New Zealand our international rankings have slipped, much to our national embarrassment. All sorts of analyses about our predicament were proffered in the public debate that followed the release of the information, but the fact remains that, independently of the rankings, New Zealand's results have gone down.

Clearly, the information is a big wake up call for New Zealanders. Many people fail to recognise what Harvard President Drew Faust recently stated, "Knowledge is replacing other resources as the main driver of economic growth, and education is increasingly become the foundation for individual prosperity and social mobility."

Herein lies the nation's challenge. The questions the 15 year olds were asked in the PISA tests reveal that the ability to take information and manipulate it via the thinking process, is the way to become intellectually literate in the 21st Century. Many of our young people clearly find this difficult.

If we are not to slide further down the international rankings there are some structural issues that need addressing in our education system. There is no doubt Government is working on some of these reforms.

Two simple points might be worth turning into action plans:

- Hard work is a big part of the PISA success stories of China, Hong Kong, Singapore, Vietnam etc. Dan Carter, Richie McCaw, Valerie Adams and others did not become world beaters without consistent hard work, determination and courage. All our young people need to learn this lesson. There is nothing new in this but the lesson is not always put in front of our young people strongly enough as an imperative for success in life.
- Life is not always fair, nor is it always easy.
 Placing high expectations of achievement in front of young people will build their resilience and develop their well-being so they are better able to master what life throws at them.

These two ideas could be added to the reality spectrum of young people. Without emphasising them and vigorously tapping into the Emotional Quotient of our young people, New Zealand will be doomed to mediocrity.

New Year greetings to everyone. Hopefully the year has started well for you.

Recent Education Initiatives

- In December Education Minister Hekia Parata announced a review of the Ministry of Education's Professional Learning and Development (PLD) expenditure in the schooling sector. An Advisory Group of sector leaders is being established.
- In November Education Minister Hekia Parata announced the 'Building on Success' Programme, which combines the best from Te Kotahitanga and He Kākano. The initiative has as its aim to further advance educational success for Māori students. Approximately a quarter of all secondary schools will be in the programme at any one time.
- On 23 January the Prime Minister announced the 'Investing in Educational Success' strategy, with \$359m allocated to sharing best practice across groups of schools. Information is available at www.minedu.govt.nz.
- Education Minister Hekia Parata has recently announced the establishment of a Taskforce on Regulations Affecting School Performance with an aim to free up schools to focus more on raising student achievement.
- The Ministry of Education is congratulated on its new online Bulletin for School Leaders, He pitopito korero. It is being sent to principals and BOT Chairs fortnightly on Mondays, then published on the Ministry of Education website.
- In association with the International Summit on Education in Wellington on 28-29 March, Festival of Education events will take place in Auckland, 21-23 March, Christchurch, 23 March, and Wellington, 29 March. Schools are urged to participate and share ideas, inspiration, success and best practice. Details are at www.festivalofeducation.org.nz.

Reminder to Proprietors and Boards of Trustees

NZCEO has recently sent or re-sent to Proprietors and BOTs the following Ministry of Education Circulars: - $\,$

- Circular 2013/30 Attendance Dues Accounts outlines the requirements for reporting to the Secretary for Education on attendance dues income and expenditure for the year ending 31 December 2013. It replaces Circular 2012/11. Audited annual attendance dues accounts are due with the Secretary for Education by 30 April 2014.
- Circular 2013/06 Payments by Parents of Students in State and Stateintegrated Schools gives advice on requests for payments in schools. It replaces Circular 1998/25.
- Circular 2012/02 Financial Governance covers conflicts of interest, recovery of overpayments and unlawful payments and procurement.

Enrolment Fees

It has come to the attention of the Ministry of Education that some integrated schools are charging parents an enrolment fee. This is not legal. All Proprietors and Boards of Trustees are advised to ensure that it is not happening. Advice on the topic has been sent to the affected parties.

Did You Know?

- 76% of early childhood teaching staff are now qualified teachers, up from 51% in 2004.
- Between June 2011 and June 2013, youth crime dropped by 19%. Statistics NZ numbers show that conviction rates in the Youth Court are at their lowest since records began. In the last few years youth crime has dropped from 22% to around 15%. According to Youth Court Judge Andrew Becroft this can be attributed to the introduction of measures like Positive Behaviour for Learning.
- The Youth Crime Action Plan (YCAP) is a 10-year plan to reduce crime by children and young people and help those who offend to turn their lives around. It is based on partnering with communities to reduce youth offending, reducing escalation to ensure

young people are dealt with at the lowest appropriate level of the youth justice system, and early and sustainable exits to divert young people from falling into an ongoing life of crime.

 Auckland's population is 1.5 million, representing 180 different ethnic groups, including the highest concentration of Pacific peoples. 40% of Auckland's population was born overseas and 25% of them speak two languages.

Viviane Robinson, in an opinion piece in a University of Auckland Centre for Excellence Newsletter issue 3, 2011, encouraged leaders to confront the question "What can I do to ensure that the time and efforts of my teachers are used in ways that maximise the probability that we achieve our student learning goals?"
