FUTURE PROOFING OUR STUDENTS AND THE NATION

Close observers of the international market place know that keeping abreast of the changing patterns of developments is a sine qua non, if one is to stay on the ball as a leader of an educational community, however small or large. Simply keeping in touch with New Zealand issues is insufficient when international events are the real drivers of what occurs in this country.

New Zealanders are great travellers and have a largely positive view of the benefits of globalisation.

The last few years have stripped out high wage, middle level jobs – technology has seen to this. Instead of the mindset being, "find a job", the new reality is, what job can I invent? Or what skill set can I bring to an employer which will add value to the enterprise, whatever this happens to be?

To be in this new league an individual has to be able to demonstrate a wide general knowledge base, plus a specific set of hard skills, as well as a strong suit of soft skills, particularly motivation, collaboration and enthusiasm

For over a generation some leaders in education and business have cajoled their groups to learn from one another and not engage in tribal warfare, since each group needs the others. School graduates need to prepare themselves to become positive participants in the world of enterprise, while businesses and NGO's need to support the education sector for obvious reasons.

In order to engage and motivate our young people projects in maths, science, language and the social sciences need to have a real world look about them. Solving real problems and developing entrepreneurial approaches to social issues are all part of teaching students how to think, both individually, and in teams. If this becomes the context in which teaching occurs, students will indeed be able to create their own jobs or ably demonstrate to a prospective employer they are able to manipulate information and create new knowledge from the data which is swimming in the internet.

Powers of Boards of Trustees Further Defined in Education Amendment Bill

Following the submission process on the proposed 2013 Education Amendment Bill, Section 75 of the Bill now states:

"Functions and powers of boards (1) A school's board must perform its functions and exercise its powers in such a way as to ensure that every student at the school is able to attain his or her highest possible standard in educational achievement. (2) Except to the extent that any enactment or the general law of New Zealand provides otherwise, a school's board has complete discretion to control the management of the school as it thinks fit."

ERO Evaluates Schools' Commitment to Māori Students

Over the last year ERO has asked schools very specific questions about how they are engaging with and supporting Māori communities, and what plans they are actioning to accelerate educational outcomes for Māori. They have also asked how schools gathered specific evidence on the success of their strategies to promote educational success of Māori, as Māori.

2012 NCEA Results Show Improvements

Final NCEA results from 2012 show significant levels of improvement. Sixty schools last year created improvements of 15% in their results, and these schools were distributed across the deciles. National figures show a 3.5% increase in Pasifika achievement and a 2% increase in Māori achievement. Students, teachers, principals, parents and the wider community have all played a part in this success, and are congratulated.

- 'School Trustees Helping you ask the right questions' has been written for boards of trustees. The booklet, launched in mid April, focuses on questions and information about student achievement and student welfare.
- 'Board Employment Responsibilities: Linking Charter Targets to Appraisal in Primary Schools' was published in late February 2013. This covers appraisal for both teachers and principals. Its statistics show that many Boards of Trustees still need to strengthen their processes.

Religious Studies Achievement Standards to be Reviewed

The Ministry of Education has signalled that it will undertake a review of the Religious Studies Achievement Standards, focusing on whether they are fit for purpose, and whether there is a suitable progression between levels one, two and three. The review was originally timetabled to take place after three years of use of the Standards. Submissions on the review will be called for in due course.

Welcome News

In late November the Education and Pacific Island Affairs Ministries jointly launched the Pasifika Education Plan. The two Ministries will work together to increase Pasifika students' participation and achievement in education, putting families and communities at the centre of decision making.

'Languages in Aotearoa New Zealand' Royal Society of New Zealand Paper

Over the last two decades New Zealand has become one of a small number of culturally and linguistically superdiverse countries. Superdiversity indicates a level of cultural complexity surpassing anything previously experienced. New Zealand is now home to 160 languages. Auckland is now one of the most diverse cities in the world. 2013 marks the 21st anniversary of the release of the 'Aotearoa: Speaking for Ourselves' report commissioned by the Ministry of Education. This document was to be a precursor to a NZ national languages policy, which has not yet been developed. However, the New Zealand Human Rights Commission developed a draft policy in 2010, which includes among its priorities for action: "Include te reo and tikanga Māori in teacher education and professional development to ensure their effective use in teaching. Ensure the continued survival and use of the Cook Islands Māori, Niuean and Tokelauan languages in New Zealand and foster the retention and use of other Pacific languages. Ensure that all new migrants and refugees have access to appropriate English language tuition."

Education New Zealand Appoints Three New Directors

Equity and Quality in Education: Supporting **Disadvantaged Students and Schools**

The executive summary of this OECD document is available at www.oecd.org/edu/equity. It provides an important set of recommendations to combat school failure and dropout, improve school equity and reduce school failure. It provides a very useful background to the educational discussion occurring in every school on this topic.

Minister Praises School Charter Completion

The Minister of Education has praised schools for their efficiency in getting school charters in by the 1 March deadline. By 7 March 75% of schools had submitted their charters, and some others had been granted extensions to the deadline. By late April 97% of charters were in.

Handbook for Boards of Trustees of Catholic Schools – 2013 edition – of Interest to All **Integrated Schools**

The 2013 edition of the Handbook for Boards of Trustees of Catholic Schools will be published and distributed at the end of May or very early June, ready for the first meetings of the new Boards. The document will also be available on the NZCEO website under Resources, For Teachers and BOT. While designed for Catholic schools much of the material has proved to be of value to all integrated schools and their Proprietors, providing useful guidelines on property, a summary of legal responsibilities, and ideas on defining and sustaining Special Character. Early Childhood Education Participation Rises

Enrolments in early childhood education services increased by 2,400 between 2011 and 2012, which is good news. However, participation by Maori and Pasifika children is still significantly below the national rate, and places available are unevenly distributed with some areas oversupplied and others undersupplied with places. Those considering opening an early childhood service would do well to consider the needs of communities with high Maori and Pasifika populations, where there is a real need. South Auckland is one such area.
