YOUR BRAND IS YOUR PROMISE

Integrated Schools over the last few years have methodically built their brand within New Zealand, as schools of quality and excellence based on a set of characteristics we call special character. This has not been done without a great deal of hard work by principals, teachers, trustees and Proprietors.

"The most powerful and enduring brands are built from the heart – if people believe they share values with a company, they will stay loyal to the brand," says Howard Schultz, Chairman and CEO of Starbucks. While some people may not like this commercial view to be associated with our schools, the truth of Schultz's assertion does apply to Integrated Schools, whatever their particular special character.

A brand is an organisational promise, a mark of trust, and represents your school's organisational DNA. As with any brand, growth of support is created by associative memory in the minds of existing customers and prospective customers (parents and students). This memory is only built up through promotion, which is frequent, consistent and anchored on basic messages.

In order to build loyalty with a community the brand needs to have these characteristics: reliability, dependability, predictability, consistency, authenticity and uniqueness.

The message needs to be clearly delivered, credible, and connected with the target audience emotionally, if it is to motivate and solidify loyalty.

It is a productive exercise to check out the nature of the brand your particular school stands for in your community.

A brand promise is supported by three principles:

- Identification of the promise (e.g 'Developing men of vision in spirit, mind and body' or 'Graduating women that inspire')
- Communicating what the promise is
- Delivering on the promise.

A focus on these three essentials is fundamental for ongoing effectiveness.

Some Interesting Statistics on Integrated Schools and their Proprietors

APIS (the Association of Proprietors of Integrated Schools) represents integrated school proprietors and their needs to the Ministry of Education and the Minister of Education. The New Zealand Catholic Education Office (NZCEO) is the secretariat for APIS. There are 27 proprietors of Catholic schools and 68 proprietors of other integrated schools in APIS. Only one proprietor of an integrated school does not belong to APIS. In July 2013 there were 238 Catholic integrated schools, with 65,595 students, and 93 other integrated schools, with 21,945 students.

Charitable Donations Tax Regulations

Boards of Trustees, parent associations and Proprietors are reminded of the regulations concerning charitable donations. Attendance dues are not a donation, and no tax rebate can be claimed on them. Donations to schools, parent teacher associations and Proprietors can qualify for a tax rebate. It is worth reminding parents of the 33% tax rebate whenever donations are sought. It might also be worthwhile to circulate again information about charitable donations through payroll giving.

Payments above a School Principal's Normal Salary

Principals, Boards of Trustees and Proprietors are reminded that in November 2013 the Ministry of Education published Education Circular 2013/27 which replaces Circular 2011/02. It specifies the rules applying when a principal receives payment or benefits above the normal salary. Such payments require concurrence to be granted by the Secretary for Education, and applications are made to the Industrial Relations section of the Ministry of Education. NZSTA's industrial relations advisors can provide guidance.

Otago, Southland Regions:


St Patrick's Catholic School, Taupo: The school was featured in an article in the Education Gazette, which reported its work trialling lessons for a resource on safety in the home.

Northland and Auckland Regions:

Liston College, Henderson: Alphaeus Ang won the title of New Zealand Sudoku Champion at the New Zealand Festival of Mindsports, and he also placed 1st in Draughts, 2nd in Chess and 1st in Pentamind (overall winner over several mindsports).

More Universities to Offer Postgraduate Initial Teacher Education Programmes

In 2014 the Universities of Auckland, AUT, Canterbury, Massey and Victoria will join the University of Otago and the University of Waikato in offering postgraduate ITE programmes. The Minister of Education believes that postgraduate qualifications will improve the expertise of graduating teachers and strengthen their practice.

Following a successful inaugural trip in 2013, Education New Zealand is setting up a 2014 short-stay programme for New Zealand students in Chilean schools this winter. The Flying Kiwis Scholarship Scheme will enable New Zealand students studying Spanish to spend approximately three weeks in Chile in mid to late June.

Student2Student Reading Programme Worth Looking At

The Smith Family, a charitable organisation in Australia, runs student2student, a programme which is based on research, and has proven results. Visit www.thesmithfamily. com.au to see how it works. Students who need to improve their reading are matched with peer buddies who help and encourage them. Each student and buddy receive an identical book pack. The reading buddy telephones the student two to three times a week for at least 20 minutes, over an 18 week period. The student reads to the buddy, who uses the skills learnt in their training to assist the student with their reading and offer encouragement and praise. The buddy keeps a simple record of each phone call and reports progress to a Volunteer Supervisor fortnightly. Pause, prompt, praise is part of the process.

- Provide assignments that encourage boys to tell their stories and proudly support their cultural identity.
