GREATER COLLABORATION BETWEEN NEW ZEALAND'S CATHOLIC SCHOOLS

When we look back to 1877 and recall that New Zealand's Catholic Bishops at that time decided they would deliberately build a national parallel Catholic school system, much has been achieved.

This was done as the country's Parliament embarked on a national framework of schools with the advent of the 1877 Education Act.

The Integration of the Catholic school system into the State system of schools in the late 1970's and the early 1980's followed the passage of the 1975 Private Schools Conditional Integration Act.

Today our 238 schools and their six Dioceses work very well together with an emphasis on the common good, which is a fundamental principle of Catholic theology.

The emergence of the technology revolution with its fibre drop initiative, and the School Network Upgrade Programme (SNUP) for every school by the end of 2016, ushers in another level of co-operation for every Catholic school. Linked to this is the Network For Learning developments, including the Pond structure and the availability at no charge of the Microsoft 365 software with the templates for the SharePoint and Lyne programmes.

While nothing dramatic is to be gained by only concentrating on one school's particular site, everything can be gained through innovative collaboration, particularly in the areas of sharing Religious Education and special character resources. Fortunately, work is going on to enable this collaboration to occur under the leadership of The Catholic Institute of Aotearoa New Zealand and the New Zealand Catholic Education Office.

It will be wonderful when teachers at, say, St Patrick's School Nightcaps in Southland and those in Pawarenga in the Hokianga, will be able to interact with one another and with all of our other schools in between.

On a broader global front, Catholic teachers and students in New Zealand can already communicate with their colleagues in the United States of America via the vibrant and innovative twitter community at www.catholicedchat.blogspot.com. Through such powerful connections we all can gain a more global perspective and learn much from one another.

We strongly urge you to use these formats in future when appointing staff, to ensure that matters of special character are adequately covered at the time of appointment.
