Education Minister Launches Excellence Awards


The Minister of Education has launched the Prime Minister's Education Excellence Awards. Entries in four categories, teaching, leadership, community engagement and governance, can come from early childhood through to tertiary and employers. The Minister of Education has announced a series of Education Festivals to be held in March 2014, to complement the International Summit of the Teaching Profession in New Zealand. To be held in Auckland, Wellington and Christchurch, the festivals will focus on collaboration, innovation and celebration, and will showcase best practice.

EDUCANZ to Replace NZ Teachers Council

The Minister of Education has announced the establishment of EDUCANZ (Education Council of Aotearoa New Zealand). The new body will sit outside the state sector, will be owned by the teaching profession, and will be accountable to all New Zealanders. It will be led by a governing body of nine board members, with the majority from the education professions. Members will be nominated by the sector and appointed by the Minister. It will take some months for the new organisation to be set up.
